Theological Musings from Dave's Laptop



You probably know that this year marks the 400th anniversary of the arrival of the first enslaved Africans to these shores. I've been reminded of this through the news, through visiting the Smithsonian

In August of 1619, a ship appeared on this horizon, near Point Comfort, a coastal port in the British colony of Virginia. It carried more than 20 enslaved Africans, who were sold to the

Museum of African-American History (twice, now), through reading "This Land was Our Land: The Great American Land Robbery" in *The Atlantic*, and through reading "The 1619 Project" of *The New York Times*.



Rather than try to summarize these powerful narratives, this week's assignment is to read them for yourself. Three links follow. The first is to "The 1619 Project" online, which is the easiest way to read it. The second link allows you to download the entire issue of *The New York Times Magazine* in which "The 1619 Project" appears. And the third link will allow you to download "This Land was Our Land" from *The Atlantic*.
